From the President

We should talk about decision-making some time. In many ways, this report is an indicator of how far the association has come, how much we have learned, and how much more work there is to do. As I move through my fourth year serving on the Board and 20th year affiliated with the WEA, I'm struck by how much our last year as an association - and indeed the last few years - can be outlined using lack Drury's SPEC model of education.



Student-centered: Our revisions process on the accreditation standards and student learning outcomes have been driven by our desire to train and develop better, more effective outdoor professionals. Clear, precise, and concise standards will provide our students with easy-to-comprehend (and challenging-to-master) goals and objectives to guide their learning and development. The Certified Outdoor Leader credential (COL) meets the demand for a meaningful and marketable testament of skill competence in wilderness leadership.

Problem-based: WEA accreditation was designed to address a consistency problem identified in the WEA affiliate system. We continue to develop our overarching Credentialing Program to address this concern, e.g., the new Certified Outdoor Educator Clinic. Experienced outdoor professionals have long asked for access to the COE credential from outside a WEA-accredited program. The Board - and in particular Kelli McMahan and Cameron Potter - has worked diligently to address this problem. The Clinic and the COE Professional Path is the result.

Experiential: More than just doing, the Board has spent countless hours reflecting on the last 40-plus years, noting our gains and lessons learned, and responding to the emerging the challenges.

Collaborative: This is a big win for the WEA this year! We have been very intentional about not only inviting our organizational and individual members to work together on standards, outcomes, and committees, but also seeking input from industry partners (AORE, AEE, state outdoor recreation offices, and more) and non-WEA experts. The ad hoc Standards Working Group was comprised of educators, field leaders, and academics from a range of backgrounds.

We have so many projects and initiatives in the pipeline! There is much more to do. But our current position and trajectory are the result of the hard work over the last 43 years; we are stronger now because of the difficulties and challenges we have faced. Join us and continue the work to improve our field and live out our passion!

need for trained outdoor leaders. This vision inspired the WEA's creation 42 years ago.


The outdoor leadership profession has grown up since its birth. One thing has not changed in these years: the need for training and a standard that guides and directs outdoor leaders today!

CREDENTIALING PROGRAM

In 2019, we rolled out the first trials of the new Certified Outdoor Leader credential. We say "new" recognizing that it's actually the "original" WEA credential. The COL was put on hiatus in 2012 as WEA accreditation came online, but feedback from our members revealed a gap between the OLTC and the COE was too big. The new COL was redesigned to fit that niche, offering an accessible yet rigorous credential for emerging outdoor professionals.



Diversity, Equity and Inclusion: The WEA launched a DEI committee committed to creating a welcoming and affirming community. The WEA joined the Diversify Outdoors Pledge and will be setting organizational goals to support our DEI initiatives.

Launching WEA Credentialing Program: We have spent the past three years testing and refining the WEA credentialing programs: Outdoor Leadership Training Course (OLTC), Certified Outdoor Leader (COL), and Certified Outdoor Educator (COE). We are excited to raise the bar of professionalism in our outdoor leadership industry.

Certified Outdoor Leader (COL) Written Exam: We are launching the written exam component to the COL credential. This will be administered through an Online Learning Management System as part of the COL Exam.

Conference: We look forward to host our first ever virtual International Conference of Outdoor Leadership on February 12, 2021.
